**FRIENDS OF NORTON CHURCH TALK** On **Friday 18th January** Alec Seccombe will present an illustrated talk on 'The work of the **Rhino Rescue Trust** - a trust for all endangered wildlife' Alec Seccombe lives in Norton-sub-Hamdon and has had a lifelong interest in wildlife and conservation, travelling extensively in East Africa. He became a Trustee of "Rhino Rescue Trust" in 1990 and worked closely with the original founder of the trust, Count Maurice Coreth, in setting up and helping to run the operation. When Count Coreth died, Alec took over as Chairman, and retains that role today. The Trust's mission is to protect all endangered species and to help surrounding communities affected by wildlife conflicts. The Trust's work embraces the protection of wildlife from poaching, particularly the Black Rhino, Elephant and Giraffe in Kenya, Zimbabwe and Namibia in Africa and the Indian Rhino, and Tiger in India. The event will be held in Norton-sub-Hamdon Village Hall commencing at **7:00 for 7:30 pm**. A wine and soft drinks bar and nibbles will be available before the presentation. Tickets costing £7 are available from Norton Community Shop or £8 at the door. All proceeds will be used to support the fabric of Norton Church.

## **PARISH COUNCIL REPORT FOR NOVEMBER 2018**

**Planning:** The Parish Council received one planning application to consider for this month.

18/03330/DPO - Development in New Rd, Norton sub Hamdon. Application to discharge a condition of the S106 agreement dated 26th July 2016 regarding the shared ownership properties.

The Chairman reported that he had spoken to the planning officer in charge and informed the Parish Council that after talks between the Housing Provider and SSDC Housing Department all seven affordable homes will be for rent. This change will allow the Housing Provider to own 100% of all the affordable homes. The Parish Council had no objection to this.

**Budget for 2019/20:** The Parish Council has been working on the budget for the next financial year starting in April 2019. From 2019 The Parish Council will be responsible for restocking the grit in the grit bins from next year as this is another service that SCC will be withdrawing from. It is likely that The Parish Council will also be responsible for other maintenance issues in the village. However, it was felt that it was important to keep the precept at the same amount and a resolution was made to do this.

**Grit Bins:** There are 5 grit bins in the village which will soon be refilled for the winter with a mixture of salt and grit. All residents are able to use this grit to spread on paths and junctions where there is an issue with snow and ice. Please feel free to do so.

**Dog fouling:** Once again, there seems to be an increase of dog fouling, particularly in Rectory Lane and leading up the footpath towards the recreation field. One person has been recorded allowing their dog to foul in this area on more than one occasion. If this carries on then the enforcement officer at SSDC will be notified and will be able to hand out on the spot fines. Please pick up after your dog. Thank you.

The next Parish Council meeting will take place on **Monday 10th December at 7.30pm in the Committee Room** in the **Village Hall**. Members of the general public are more than welcome to attend. **CHRISTMAS GREENERY** Holly, Ivy and other greenery are part of the traditional Christmas decorations but in pre-Christian times, when the Winter Solstice was celebrated, it was a means of warding off evil spirits and celebrating new growth. The coming of Christianity gave many pagan traditions a Christian perspective. The prickly leaves of holly, for instance, now represented the crown of thorns worn by Jesus at His crucifixion and the berries became the drops of blood caused by the thorns. Ivy, which needs to cling to something to survive, became a reminder of our need to cling to God for survival. Laurel, fir and yew trees are now symbols of victory and everlasting life with God. Traditionally Christmas greenery should be taken down, with the decorations, after Twelfth Night (5th January) but during the Middle Ages it was often left hanging until Candlemas (2nd February) when Christians celebrate Jesus as a baby being presented in the Temple. This Christmas the origin of the decorations we use might raise a few questions in our mind but more importantly are we challenged to acknowledge the meaning and true significance of the festival we celebrate. **CARYMOOR'S FIGHT AGAINST WASTE** Carymoor Environmental Trust is a nature conservation and environmental education charity based near Castle Cary. Through our unique site we aim to inspire our visitors to live more sustainably. Since 1996 Carymoor has transformed 100 acres of capped landfill into a species-rich nature reserve. On top of this area of landfill we have developed a range of different habitats with meadows, woodland and wetland now home to a wide range of wildlife. The area of landfill was originally filled with waste from householders from Mendip and South Somerset between 1970 and 2000. Next to this area is the current landfill site where waste from your black bin waste is currently taken. Seeing the scale of the landfill is a great catalyst for change, as once you've seen it you don't want to further contribute to it.

Reducing, reusing and recycling waste is as important as ever. Each year Somerset pays £12 million in landfill tax to bury this waste. Recycling saves the tax payer a lot of money and reduces the amount of natural resources that are needed for new products. It also saves a lot of energy. You can find out where your recycling goes and what it is made into through Somerset Waste Partnership's annual End Use Register: [www.somersetwaste.gov.uk/end-use-register](http://www.somersetwaste.gov.uk/end-use-register). Each year around 100 schools come to Carymoor to learn about living more sustainably and to have a first-hand experience of wildlife. The site is all about contrasts, from the sights, sounds and smells of the landfill site to the wildlife and greenery of the nature reserve. Children come to learn about the 3Rs – Reduce, Reuse and Recycle – and we try to inspire them to make changes in school too. This year Carymoor has been working with Somerset Waste Partnership on a new Schools Against Waste programme and we can provide a free visit per year to primary schools across Somerset. Since February we have reached over 12,000 children through these visits and we hope children will take a lead in the fight against waste. You can find out more about what you can recycle at the Somerset Waste Partnership website: [www.somersetwaste.gov.uk](http://www.somersetwaste.gov.uk) Carymoor has a team of volunteers who help out with all aspects our work from practical conservation, wildlife monitoring to supporting our education work. There are videos and publications available to help you maximise the efficiency of your electricity usage and it is worth taking the time to do this because lots of people don't run them correctly. Loneliness is an ongoing problem and it is important to look out for those who may be lonely near you. Do you have an elderly or isolated neighbour who would welcome a friendly chat or an offer to get shopping? Often we can signpost them to support what is in the community such as their local church, community centres, village halls and of course their Village Agent.

Do you know neighbours who are struggling to manage caring for their loved one? They can refer themselves to the Somerset Carers Service where a Carers Agent can visit them in the privacy of their own home and support them in their role as a carer. The Somerset Carers Service has a dedicated Freephone helpline that anyone can call Monday to Friday during office hours – 0800 31 68 600 – [www.somersetcarers.org](http://www.somersetcarers.org). Perhaps make the Surgery Health Walk part of your new year's resolutions. Village Agents can support you in finding out about your local events maybe an art group, WI or bowling and how to attend these. Radio Somerset also have a 'What's On' section in the mornings to tune into. I support unpaid carers in South East Somerset to connect them with community resources, support groups and personal support around benefits and allowances. We also have a new team of Community Agents and Village Agents in South Somerset for anyone to contact for support and information.
