HAMDON MEDICAL CENTRE 'FLU VACCINATIONS - THIS YEAR BY APPOINTMENT This years 'flu vaccinations will be BY APPOINTMENT ONLY for patients that are in an 'At Risk' group including all patients aged 65 years and over and those with a chronic disease (such as heart, lung, liver or neurological disease). Patients who have diabetes, a weak immune system, that are pregnant, seriously overweight or are carers are also entitled to a 'flu vaccination together with Health and Social Care staff who work in registered care/nursing homes and registered domiciliary care providers (care agencies). To book an appointment please ring 01935 827003 or 01935 827004 between 9.00am and 10.30am or 4.30pm and 5.30pm Monday to Friday. If you have a pre-booked appointment with a Nurse or Technician from the end of September you can request to have your 'flu jab at this appointment. If you are housebound and cannot attend the surgery (friends, relatives and taxis are unable to bring you), please contact the surgery as above.

PETER & ANNE LEAVING IN 2019 Many of you will know that I am retiring at the start of 2019 – not giving up being a Christian Minister, just no longer being paid or living in Chiselborough! For the last 38 years (including 13 years here) I have had the privilege of being paid to serve churches in 5 dioceses. When we arrived (after 13 years in 3 Worcestershire parishes) it was always with the intention of retiring at 65 – and I will do so a month after that birthday. Our last Sunday will be **January 6th** (Epiphany – arrival of Wise men!) and our last service at **3.00 pm at Norton**; an informal Songs of Praise featuring all our family, and then something to eat in Norton Village Hall. My last communion service will be the united 5th Sunday service at **10.00am on December 30th at Stoke**. People are asking when my successor will come (or indeed whether he or she has already been appointed). There are complex reasons why such appointments often take some time, and cannot be started until I have left. The earliest a person could be in place as Rector of the Ham Hill Villages Benefice would be early next Autumn. However across the 7 parishes there is an excellent team of ministers – Clergy and Lay Readers – who will continue to serve you.

HEALTH WALKS A good start was made when the first two walks organised by the SSDC took place and we even had our blood pressure checked before one session! This was all arranged most efficiently by the SSDC and it would be good if a few more people came along to take advantage of this opportunity to keep fit. The walks will only be short – about an hour long and just in the local area. Dogs welcome. We start from the Reading Room so come along and meet other villagers and keep fit at the same time. We usually stay for a cup of tea in the cafe at the end. Once the walks get going the group can decide which days and times would be best. FLOOD RESILIENCE In 2016 the Norton Sub Hamdon community and Parish Council worked proactively with the Flood and Water Risk Management (FWRM) team at Somerset County Council (SCC) in response to the flood event on the 6th February 2016 - an event that saw a number of properties in Norton Sub Hamdon suffer serious internal flooding. Although we have had an extremely dry summer this year, the autumn is fast approaching and it would be a good time for the whole community to start thinking about repeating the good community work of 2016/17 - the maintenance / vegetation clearance of all ditches and the Little Norton stream, and the identification and communication of any blocked highway drains in and around Norton Sub Hamdon to SCC's Area Highways team. Therefore, we would like to encourage the community to continue the work towards making Norton Sub Hamdon as flood resilient as possible and recommend that maintenance work / clearance of vegetation from the stream and ditches in and around Norton Sub Hamdon be carried out while the ground is still dry and before the wetter months are upon us with the caveat that vegetation work should not be started until the end of the bird nesting season (February to August). SCC's FWRM team flood resilience work continues and we are currently working with Flash Flood Doors Ltd to procure property level flood protection for some of the properties that were internally flooded. It is hoped that the flood protection products will be delivered and installed by the end of October. NORTON PARISH COUNCIL REPORT FOR SEPTEMBER 2018

Planning: The Parish Council received no planning applications for this month.

Notifications on past planning applications are as follows:

18/00726/FUL Rocklands House, Little Street. Conversion, side extension and alteration of existing coach house to form a separate dwelling house. Approved.

17/04124/FUL - Land Opposite Tinkabee Cottage, Little Norton, Norton Sub Hamdon, Stoke Sub Hamdon, Somerset,, Change of use of land, stationing of a log cabin and two shepherds huts for holiday let. **NOTIFICATION OF APPEAL.** Approved

Defibrillator Training Session: Due to only one person showing any interest in the defibrillator training, this will not be taking place.

Name of New Development: The Clerk had received notification from the SSDC offices regarding the proposed name from the developer of the new development on New Road. The proposal was "Rosebay Close" which the Parish Council felt didn't relate to the site. SSDC asked the Parish Council to come up with an alternative. This was discussed at the meeting in great detail and involved the public that were present. It was decided that due to the land being best remembered as a fruit farm, and renowned for its Bramley apples, the development should be named after these. A member of the public present at the meeting suggested 'Bramley Fields'. It was agreed unanimously.

Seat from tree trunk: A seat will be carved out of the final piece of tree trunk in the recreation ground and will be positioned at the bottom of the field when it is finished.

Update from Somerset County Flooding Manager - Andy Lambart: Mr Lambart has been working hard for the Norton residents that suffered with flooding back in 2016. He sent a report to the Clerk which said, 'We are working with five properties in NsH that flooded internally on the 6/2/16. We are funding/spending £9,600 on the five properties. This averages at £1,200 per household. The total Property Level Protection scheme for the whole of Somerset is approximately £33,000. This money comes from the SCC Flood and Water Risk Management fund. For your information, this has been cut by £80,000 in the recent days cuts, meaning that Norton will have received 29% of the overall PLR assigned budget for Somerset.

THIS MONTH Punkies Punkie (or Punky) Night, which falls on the last Thursday of October, is a tradition whose origins link it to Chiselborough and Hinton St George. Fair Place, Chiselborough, was the site of an annual Fair which was founded in 1257 and continued until 1894. Sometime in the Middle Ages, it is said, all the men of Hinton St George went off to one of the Fairs but their overindulgence with the local brew left them losing track of time. Their worried wives, anxious for their safe return, set out to search for them and lit their way with candles placed in hollowed out pumpkins (to protect them from the weather). One can but guess that, in an era when Ghoulies and Ghosties were very

real to people, the inebriated men would have somewhat quickened their drunken stagger home to Hinton! Tradition records the event and in Hinton St George children go out, with their carved punkies, in groups singing 'punkie songs'. The traditional one being:-- 'It's Punkie Night tonight, it's Punkie Night tonight, give us a candle, give us a light, it's Punkie Night tonight, it's Punkie Night tonight, Adam and Eve wouldn't believe it's Punkie Night tonight.' Sadly the development of punkies into a decorated art form does not accurately depict the illumination that gave rise to the 'face-like' characters originally seen (and feared) on the road from Chiselborough to Hinton. VILLAGE AGENT REPORT Scams! We do talk about them a lot but it is important to do so as they can be really disturbing to receive and potentially very expensive and there has been some recent activity to mention. A recent call is from a well-spoken lady who tells you that there is a court case pending against you. It is often for unpaid tax. She will ask you to call her back on a given number. This is usually a premium number and will be costing you lots of money while they slowly ask for all your details! The advice from us hasn't really changed - put the phone down quickly and don't talk. Chat to a neighbour or call me or citizen's advice if you are anxious about what you did. You can also report it on the Action Fraud website www.actionfraud.police.uk phone number 0300 123 2040. The latter also have information about recent scams to watch out for. You can also tap the phone number into your search engine (google it!) and it will tell you what type of

phone number it is. According to Which, www.which.co.uk/consumer-rights/advice/premium-rate-number-scams 'To avoid being ripped off in this way, you should firstly never use numbers beginning with 084, 087, 090, 091 or 098 when calling government advice lines'

Purchases of coin collections and figurines can often be a costly mistake so do your research before buying and also check that the website you are buying from displays the padlock icon before the <https://www>, before sharing details. A new number Call 38 provides you with the phone number 033388888888 (three 3's eight 8's) that you can use when filling out electronic (or paper) forms so that the box is filled. The number will answer and say "TrueCall38 is handling my calls. I prefer not to be contacted by phone, so please contact me via my email address. Goodbye!"

Don't forget that you can buy phones with a call blocker service or use the BT call blocker service. This means that the phone will only automatically answer numbers that you have previously agreed to. It will ask the caller to put in who you are and display it so that the call recipient can decide whether to take the call.

This is also useful if you care for someone with Dementia because they are less likely to share all your bank details with the caller if they have to press the correct buttons to release the call.

The last and most disturbing scam is when people who are helping us by picking up our money from the bank are really helping themselves to your savings. This is called "Mate Crime". Get them to take you to the bank rather than giving them your card and pin. Get help from CAB or Age UK to put your bills on direct debit and use phone or internet access to your bank accounts. October is also time to register for your warmer homes discount – phone your electricity and gas supplier. It is also time to book your flu vaccination!

We have a new team of Community Agents and Village Agents in South Somerset.
