HAMDON MEDICAL CENTRE 'FLU VACCINATIONS - THIS YEAR BY APPOINTMENT This years 'flu vaccinations will be **BY APPOINTMENT ONLY** for patients that are in an 'At Risk' group including all patients aged 65 years and over and those with a chronic disease (such as heart, lung, liver or neurological disease). Patients who have diabetes, a weak immune system, that are pregnant, seriously overweight or are carers are also entitled to a 'flu vaccination together with health and social care staff who work in registered care/nursing homes and registered domiciliary care providers (care agencies). To book an appointment please ring 01935 827003 or 01935 827004 between **9.00am and 10.30am or 4.30pm and 5.30pm Monday to Friday**. Lines are now open. If you already have a pre-booked appointment with a Nurse or Technician you can request to have your 'flu jab at this appointment. If you are housebound and cannot attend the surgery (friends, relatives and taxis are unable to bring you), please contact the surgery as above.

HAMDON MEDICAL CENTRE. At the last meeting of the Patients' Participation Group the following disturbing facts were given. During the month of September 43 patients failed to keep their appointment with their GP without giving any notice of cancellation. This wasted 7 hours of GP's time and other patients could have used them. 25 patients failed to attend their appointments with their Technician wasting 4 hours of their time. 29 patients failed to keep their appointment with their Practice Nurse. In total 97 Patients wasted 20.5 hours which the NHS tell us cost the Hamdon Practice around £1,300 for September. Jan Langley Secretary to the Hamdon PPG.

to grow membership numbers. That said we welcomed some new members, but unfortunately lost some too. The raffle, tombola, stalls and afternoon teas all helped to engage attendees of all ages, whilst helping to offset costs. We received numerous encouraging comments from both the judges and public which makes it all worthwhile. The committee work tirelessly to make the Plant Sale and Flower Show a continued success and each year seems to build on the last. On behalf of the committee we are so grateful to everyone who has contributed throughout the year, be it Patron membership, growing plants, selling teas, collecting for the tombola, putting up marquees or selling raffle tickets - every contribution however big or small makes a difference. FLOOD RESILIENCE In 2016 the Norton Sub Hamdon community and Parish Council worked proactively with the Flood and Water Risk Management (FWRM) team at Somerset County Council (SCC) in response to the flood event on the 6th February 2016 - an event that saw a number of properties in Norton Sub Hamdon suffer serious internal flooding. Although we have had an extremely dry summer this year, the autumn is fast approaching and it would be a good time for the whole community to start thinking about repeating the good community work of 2016/17 - the maintenance / vegetation clearance of all ditches and the Little Norton stream, and the identification and communication of any blocked highway drains in and around Norton Sub Hamdon to SCC's Area Highways team. Therefore, we would like to encourage the community to continue the work towards making Norton Sub Hamdon as flood resilient as possible and recommend that maintenance work / clearance of vegetation from the stream and ditches in and around Norton Sub Hamdon be carried out while the ground is still dry and before the wetter months are upon us with the caveat that vegetation work should not be started until the end of the bird nesting season (February to August). SCC's FWRM team flood resilience work continues and we are currently working with Flash Flood Doors Ltd to procure property level flood protection for some of the properties that were internally flooded. It is hoped that the flood protection products will be delivered and installed by the end of October. VILLAGE AGENT INFORMATION It's getting colder! Now is a good time to think about your heating and insulation. Open fires and wood burners need to be cleaned regularly. The National Fire Protection Association says, "Chimneys, fireplaces, and vents should be inspected at least once a year for soundness, freedom from deposits, and correct clearances. Chimney Cleaning / Chimney Inspection Should Be Done Annually. Check out your local chimney sweeps.

Also check that your smoke alarms and carbon monoxide alarms (for oil fired heating and open fires and wood burners) are working. Consider a home safety check from Devon and Somerset fire service <https://www.dsfire.gov.uk>. Call Freephone 0800 05 02 999 who are focussing heavily on fire prevention alongside the proposed service cuts (don't forget to sign the petition!).

Homeowners and landlords can apply for a loan to make improvements to their homes. Essential home repairs such as a replacement boiler, new windows and doors, roof repairs (including thatch), plumbing, heating or electrical works and even structural repairs are included under the scheme. Winter tip 1: Drying clothes on a radiator can cause the damp to circulate around the house until it finds a cold patch where it will turn to mould. Try to keep the doors closed and windows open in the room that you use to dry. A bowl of salt can be used to catch the humidity or hanging wardrobe dehumidifiers can be purchased cheaply from discount stores. Winter tip 2: If you are in the house throughout the day, you may consider volunteering and joining social groups so that you are not having to heat the house so much and this will also make the evenings less isolating.

Winter tip 3: Don't forget to check your drains and gutters for the build -up of debris which can cause blockages and splits when the water starts to freeze. Local window cleaners often offer this service if you are unable to check yourself.

Health Tip!! – most of us think it is important to drink more in the warmer weather to avoid dehydration but did you know that the same can apply in wintertime too? Turning on the heat can also lead to dehydration especially as we get older so make sure you are regularly drinking even in the colder weather. Keeping adequately hydrated is especially important in helping to keep infections such as urine infections at bay and taking simple steps such as drinking enough water can help us stay healthier. If you have any concerns

about your fluid intake then please contact your GP. You may wish to add that warm drinks raise your body temperature in a cheaper way than turning on the heating!
