PLEASE BE VIGILANT: Message from the Parish Council

Drug paraphernalia has once again been found in the village. This isn't the first time in the last few months that drug related items have been found in Norton, and the Parish Council are concerned about the potential public safety impacts. The Police are aware and have been out. They have increased their patrols of the village. The Parish Council will be having a meeting with our new PCSO imminently. If you find any drug paraphernalia when you are out walking, **PLEASE DO NOT TOUCH IT**. Report it immediately to the Police on 101, and also report it directly to SSDC who will arrange the safe removal of it.

We will report it to our PCSO and also SSDC to get it removed ASAP. We have also had an increase in crime and vandalism in the village. In the last couple of weeks, we've had two fires deliberately started – both arson attacks which resulted in the fire service being called to extinguish them. Creedy Bridge has also been vandalised. The large piece of hamstone that was made loose when the bridge was hit by a vehicle/trailer earlier in the year, was thrown into the river, along with all the orange barricade fencing that Highways had erected, plus the old footpath gate and fencing opposite, which was also thrown into the river.

If you see ANYTHING that you feel is suspicious behaviour, then please report it immediately to the police. If you have no luck with ringing 101 and you feel it is serious then ring 999. These latest reports of drug use have included these people driving to this village location and driving away afterwards, which is very concerning, as they must be under the influence of drugs. AN INVASIVE WEED is spreading along our local river banks called Himalayan Balsam. There is a lot in the area behind the church where the pigs were and also in the horse paddock off Broadmead. It looks pretty with a nice purple flower head on the top not dissimilar to a sweet pea and it very quickly takes over replacing all other plant diversity. It can cause river bank erosion too as when it dies back in the autumn there are none of the usual grass roots to hold the river bank together. It's very easy to pull up as the roots are so small. So I invite everyone out in a walk to become a 'Balsam Basher' and help protect our landscape and its native plants. Vicky Burrough.

THE CHURCHYARD Maybe you spotted the "Bee Friendly" sign on an unmown patch by the south door of the Church. Maybe you thought "Oh dear, that looks untidy" or "Wow, wild flowers!" Most churchyards have a wealth of flora laid down over centuries, and it really is worth studying them more closely, along with the bees and other insects they attract. From May onwards we found 23 different wild flowers in that small area, all beautiful and some exceptionally so, such as Germander Speedwell, Lady's Bedstraw, Self Heal (both purple and white varieties), and Primrose and Woodruff. Now with the various plants shedding seed the site is gradually being trimmed (with shears!), it's a beautiful spot to just quietly clip away. We must now accept that we are helping to harm the planet with our collective behaviour towards the environment and try to do all we can to protect the wild flowers and insects. So loosen up a bit with the weeding in the garden and please don't use toxic chemicals; insect populations are declining significantly as a result of their use. All have as much right to be here as we have.

THE OLD SCHOOL SITE In the last few weeks, I have been contacted by several Norton residents as Rector and Chair of your Parochial Church Council and owners of the 'Old School Site'. They have made some very interesting suggestions about how the site might be developed to the benefit of the whole community. The PCC have explained to me the very real practical and financial challenges of maintaining the site and their long-term concerns about its condition which I share with many. One suggestion, supported by the Parish Council, is to create a 'Garden of Remembrance' for all the village to enjoy. Another is to create an environmentally sensitive area of biodiversity linking the churchyard and Norton school's playing fields and grounds. Both ideas are mutually compatible and in keeping with our Church policy of being better stewards of God's wonderful creation and playing our part in combating the Climate Emergency. There is clearly an opportunity to create something very special for our community, although it will require significant planning, funding and long term management expertise that the church does not have. FRIENDS OF NORTON CHURCH (FNC) CONCORDE EVENING I would like to express my personal appreciation to all of you who attended that evening and to Martin Philpott, retired airline pilot, who contributed to the talk with me. In doing so, you have made your valued contribution towards the essential church fabric fund-raising, as described in the FNC web page - address at the top of page 1 of this newsletter - which has a link to slides showing church repairs conducted over a 10 year period, all fully funded by the FNC, either directly or indirectly. Numerous favourable comments on the talk have been received, for which I thank you very much. To do justice to John Legg in whose memory this talk was held, and his colleagues with their unique, very high technology achievement, it was necessary, however, to describe it in a manner which would 'reach' a mostly non-technical audience. Two messages received which I found to be particularly rewarding are "I know nothing about aeroplanes, but I enjoyed the talk" and the other was "I thought I would be bored, but I wasn't".

A very interesting piece of knowledge emerged from the evening regarding the arrival of the British Concorde prototype at the Yeovilton airfield in 1976. Norton school children, and their parents, had received special invitations to attend this exciting and historic event. I was informed that this was initiated by an Air Traffic Controller who had, in advance, passed on this information to his wife who was a teacher at Norton school. READING ROOM: The Reading Room is a Grade II listed building in the heart of Norton -sub -Hamdon believed to date from the late 18th century. It was originally a forge, but by the late 19th century had become a Reading Room where men had access to reading materials they would have otherwise been unable to afford. Village groups were also able to meet there. At this time the building belonged to the Trask family, who were major employers in the area and lived in Courtfield House. In 1952 the Reverend Harold Trask conveyed it, via Colonel G E Bruce and Miss E Trask, to a Charitable Trust for the use of inhabitants of the Village and surrounding area. In recent years it has hosted many local groups and has been used for a café, art classes and exhibitions, and meetings. It has recently undergone a major refurbishment updating the facility for the 21st century. The Committee is passionate about keeping this unique and special building running for the benefit of the Village, but due to changes in job commitments and length of service the Committee will be looking for a new Chairperson, Secretary and Treasurer in the New Year. BEGINNING AGAIN Refugee Support Group held its Music in the Meadow fundraising event in July, seventeen months after the last fundraising concert, and I am glad to report it was a great success. There were five minutes or so of rain at its start but the sun appeared as the afternoon continued with the haunting sounds of the sitar followed by lively traditional folk music. The appreciative audience generously bought raffle tickets, delicious cakes, recycled books and guessed the name of a teddy. In all we raised £1731.51 shared between Care4Calais in France and Safe Passage, the legal charity which exists to unite unaccompanied children with their families in Europe.

As you are aware from world news numbers of refugees are increasing as wars within nations endure and many autocratic regimes dominate and imprison their people; their stories are harrowing. Those fleeing disastrous climate crisis events will begin to make an impact. It would seem that the work of refugee charities and voluntary groups will long be needed, but nothing can be achieved without public support. We are very grateful to all our supporters, past, present and future for their understanding, compassion and kindness.
