NORTON & CHISELBOROUGH FLOWER SHOW REPORT It was wonderful to be able to put the Show on again this year, and to have so many attend on the day, many of whom had not been to the Flower Show before. The weather was perfect, and the new layout across two marquees seemed to work well, although we won't be putting the cakes in front of the windows again! We will also look at having some additional seating around the grounds for future events. Of the new attractions, the Promenade Band was a particular favourite, the Bubble Man and the Flower Princess with her Unicorn were well received by the younger visitors.

Visitor numbers were our highest yet, with the gates taking an impressive £585. Refreshments and cakes did exceptionally well too, taking £754, with all the other stalls and attractions remaining busy to the end of the day. Whilst this all helped tremendously to offset costs with overall income up c.£500 from 2019, costs rose significantly this year (+£1,550) mainly due to general cost increases, changes to the marquee layout and children's entertainment.

Whilst attendance numbers were up significantly, the number of individual exhibitors was markedly down from 2019 (30%). This could be due to growing conditions, but also a result of not having a show for the two previous years. The entry numbers had

started to increase from 2018 to 2019, so we are hopeful they will improve again next year. Children's entries, though, are showing a general decline from 110 entries in 2018 and 62 in 2019 to just 41 in 2022, a 37% drop. We hope to engage with the local schools to encourage more children to participate. We will be further analysing entry data to look at trends through all the classes and categories. The Committee would like to thank everyone involved in making this year's show such a success, and a special note of thanks to the Norton Ladies Group who did such an amazing job organising and running the afternoon teas in the Village Hall. Our AGM will be on Monday, October 3rd at 5.30pm in the Meeting Room, Norton Village Hall. All are welcome, but please note it will finish promptly at 6pm, as there is a Committee Meeting directly afterwards.

A PERSONAL GOODBYE TO JAMES (JIM) GRAY.

This is very hard for me to write - as was my tribute to my friendie Marie only a few weeks ago. Heartbreaking. I first met Jim when he and Rosemary bought the shop from Sam Cottle. Jim and I soon realised we were lifelong supporters of Plymouth Argyle F.Club so obviously we had a bond! We went to our first away game together at Bristol Rovers - this was before Jim's stroke. We got to the ground, all dressed in the good old Green and Black, and went to buy 2 tickets for the Away end. They would only sell us tickets for the Home end, in case we caused trouble - us! really? Not Jim - the noisy one was me! That was obviously a no no from us. So we turned round and came home.

Jim enjoyed being a shop-keeper, and loved meeting people and chatting, and catching up on the gossip. Unfortunately he didn't have much time to enjoy it. He was struck down by a stroke. Quite a shock for us all. He was quite ill for a time, but with physio, determination, hard work, and support from Rose, he gradually started to get better. He was right-handed, and as it affected his left side, he could use his laptop and write etc. His mind was as sharp as ever, so he could do everything he needed. He was a member (Treasurer - ed) of Norton Historical Society until it folded, Treasurer of the Village Hall, and Treasurer of the CLT, and other things. His real love was his football team, and Rose drove us down some Saturdays. But when he had his car especially adapted, we were able to go down regularly to see them and had Season Tickets .

His life wasn't just dominated by Argyle!!! but the first thing every morning he would log on to the Argyle Website, to catch up on any news. He loved animals, Family History, Reading, chatting, and he loved his food, especially puddings! There is so much more I could say about Jim, but most of you that knew him, knew what a great person he was. Clever, determined, helpful, friendly and much more. I will be supporting the boys and cheer them on for him. I am sure he will be with me when I watch some of the Home Games on Argyle TV, that we used to watch together in his Argyle

Room... I will miss him more than I can say, as will many others. It has been a pleasure knowing him. To sum Jim up, he was a lovely man.) RIP Jim. Jennie Harris.

NORTON VILLAGE HALL. The Committee is very sad to announce the passing of Jim Gray very recently. Jim joined our committee and served as our Treasurer for many years until he passed the reins over to Lindsay Clayton. She passed them over to our current Treasurer and Booking Clerk, Sarah Hallett. Jim was an amazing man, and it was a pleasure to have him on board. He was very efficient, and everything had to be exactly right. We will miss seeing him in the village. Our sincere condolences go to Rosemary and family on their loss. We have had a quiet time since July. No meeting in August. We have had compliments about our ceiling fans in the function room which are a recent addition. In October we will be having the Function Room floor refurbished so the Hall will be shut for 3 days - October 5th,6th and 7th. This work should make a big improvement. The floor has had no major work done on it since the Hall was opened in 2006, so it has lasted quite well. The hall bookings have been steady, and all our regulars have restarted their classes, which include Harmony303 Choir, Pilates, Keep Fit, Ballroom, HYG (youth club.), and monthly bookings by CADAS, (the Crewkerne and District Astronomical Society.) We will be meeting again later this month so I will report in the next issue.

READING ROOM NEWS: We had planned to upgrade the lean-to roof in September, but when the first few tiles were removed it was obvious that the supporting rafters were in a bad way and would need completely replacing. The tiles have been replaced temporarily until we can get an estimate of cost and time needed to carry out the work. In the main room the old loft ladder has been replaced allowing easier access to the loft area for storage. The Reading Room continues to be used by Katy's Bakes and various local groups, but is available over weekends and in the evening for group meetings or private events. PARISH NORTON COUNCIL REPORT FOR SEPTEMBER 2022

The Parish Council managed to have a very successful monthly meeting at the beginning of September.

Planning: There were no planning applications to discuss in September.

Dog Owners: We have received reports from landowners in Norton that there has been an increase in dog mess being left again. It is particularly bad at the far end of Rectory Lane and Broadmead Lane

where both lanes turn into tracks. There has been repeated dog fouling left in front of farmers'/landowners' gateways in both these lanes. Some gateways have footpaths through the land but some do not. There is no excuse in either of these places with dog bins provided in several locations. Dog mess is the most unacceptable and offensive type of litter on our streets. Dog fouling is not only deeply unpleasant, it is dangerous. Whilst rare, contact with dog excrement can cause toxocariasis – a nasty infection that can lead to dizziness, nausea, asthma and even blindness or seizures. Anyone who fails to clear up after their dog can be issued with a Fixed Penalty Notice of up to £100. If the case goes to court this could cost the owner or person in charge of the animal up to £1,000. The law states that being unaware a dog has fouled or not having a suitable bag is not a reasonable excuse. The dog warden has been called and is visiting.

Dogs on leads when walking in fields with livestock present: We are now approaching 'tupping time' and ewes grazing will soon be pregnant throughout the winter into April. Please keep dogs on leads if walking through a field with animals grazing and stay on the footpaths at all times.

Footpath Gates: There are an awful lot of gates being left open on footpaths around Norton. Even if there are no animals in the field please shut the gate behind you – there may be a dog loose and if the gate is shut, it could very well stop them from running onto a road and causing an accident.

Jim Gray: The Parish Council was very sad to hear about the passing of Jim. Jim has been a huge part of the village for so many years and in particular was the Parish Council internal auditor. We all send our sincere condolences to Rose.

CLT Update: Mrs Liz Maunder, secretary of the CLT read out a report which gave a brief history of their work as well as an update on recent events concerning the shop and post office. Chairman Cllr. More asked how much in pledges they had now received. Mrs Maunder replied that it was now in the region of £20,000, although she explained that there were no guarantees that all the pledges would be fulfilled as some people's position may well have changed due to the rise in living costs, since offering their pledge. The Chairman asked how many new volunteers had come forward since the public meeting. Mrs Maunder replied that only 3 people had come forward. When the shop was first taken over by the CLT they had in the region of 90 volunteers and now that number was down to 31. Mrs Maunder reported that there had been many new shareholders applying to join and as long as any further applications were in by the 15th September then they would become shareholders in time for the next meeting. Mrs Maunder asked if the Parish Council could possibly help to support the shop financially. The Clerk reported that she had been in touch with SALC on how the Parish Council could legally support the shop. SALC had informed the Clerk that the PC are restricted to the spend cap of S137 as there is no other power for a spend of this nature. The S137 payment for Norton PC is currently budgeted at £200.00 per year. This amount could significantly rise if the Parish Council agreed to it in the next budget (amount is worked out to a specific formula/amount per elector), but this wouldn't come into effect until the next financial year which doesn't start until April 2023. Applications to be considered for this year's S137 are received in January '23 for a decision at the February '23 PC meeting. The CLT would be more than welcome to put in their application letter in January if they would like to be considered for this. For a full report please read the minutes.
