PARISH COUNCIL REPORT FOR NOVEMBER 2022

The Parish Council managed to have a very successful monthly meeting at the beginning of October.

Planning: There were no planning applications to discuss in November.

New Parish Councillor: Welcome to Jennie Harris: Following the resignation of Stuart Maunder the Parish Council co-opted Jennie Harris to the Parish Council at the beginning of the meeting. Many of you will already know that Jennie used to be a Parish Councillor for Norton and we are delighted to welcome her back. Jennie has an amazing knowledge of Norton past and present, so makes a perfect Parish Councillor for the village. If you have anything you would like her to report back to the Parish Council on your behalf, then you will often find her volunteering her time in the shop or village hall.

Resignation of Rachel Cumberbatch: The Parish Council received the resignation of Rachel Cumberbatch in October due to family commitments. Although Rachel hasn't been a Parish Councillor for very long, she certainly has made a huge impact with her enthusiasm and humour in that time and we shall

definitely miss her presence at Parish Council meetings. We wish her well.

The Parish Council have been working with our Monitoring Officer to follow the correct procedure with regards to advertising the vacancy and it looks like we will be able to Co-opt at the December meeting. If you would like to be considered for the role then please email the Clerk who will tell you more about what's involved with being a Parish Councillor (nortonpcclerk@outook.com) and the procedure with regards to Co-opting.

Norton sub Hamdon Parish Council meets on the second Monday of every month except August. You can become a councillor as long as you are: British or a citizen of the Commonwealth or European Union, at least 18 years old, registered to vote in the area or have lived, worked or owned property there for at least 12 months before an election. You can't be a councillor if you: Work for the council you want to be a councillor for, or for another local authority in a political restricted post, are the subject of a bankruptcy restrictions order or interim order, have been sentenced to prison for three months or more (including suspended sentences) during the five years before election day, have been convicted of a corrupt or illegal practice by an election court. If you are in any doubt about whether you are eligible to stand as a councillor, you should contact the electoral services department at your local council for advice.

Crime: There has been a rise in criminal activity in Norton within the last month. Both incidents have been reported to the Police and incident numbers have been issued. The first incident was during half-term week when eggs were thrown at a number of front doors. The second was a report of 3 vehicles having their tyres slashed. The Clerk has spoken to the Police and more patrols will be happening in the evenings and later at night. If you do see anything that you feel is suspicious behaviour please do not hesitate to ring the Police on either 101 or 999 (depending on how important the information you have to report is). Somerset's Warm Welcome Initiative: Somerset County Council is asking neighbours to look out for each other this winter and share a warm room together. Many people are struggling to heat a room let alone their house this winter and if you know of a neighbour in this position and you are able to offer them a warm place and drink for a couple of hours, then SCC are urging you to do so. They are also launching The Warm Welcome initiative which is a network of venues that will offer an inviting place for people to keep warm. These venues will offer optional activities, or a place to get some work/homework done, or even just see a friendly face for a chat. Some funding will be available for these community buildings offering support. Spark Somerset is being funded to develop the programme and build a framework, identify appropriate spaces and co-ordinate the project moving forward. Somerset Libraries will be open as usual to offer a warm and welcoming space to all. Once all of the warm spaces have been confirmed, a public map will be made available. There seems to be an increase in people who are bagging their dog poo and then throwing it in the hedge or ditch! There is one place in particular (footpath off New Road) where this is getting worse - the bags are very distinctive (blue bag). Why? If you have gone to the trouble of picking it up in the first place, then take it to the nearest dog or litter bin (you can use either - we have plenty in the village), or take it home and put it in your large black waste bin.
